NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Heritage means different things to different people. But when it comes to planning, buildings and places are often top of the list. There are many mining heritage features in Cornwall. Austin's Engine House stands high on Penpillick Hill overlooking Tywardreath Highway. But for something a bit different, go inside the red telephone box in the centre of Tywardreath and see what's on show in the "Art Box". Listen to people in Par talking about how the whole area was originally the sea with tidal creeks running up to Treesmill and elsewhere until the estuary slowly silted up. Go for a walk, enjoy the tranquillity, observe the wildlife and look out for the Cornish hedges and wonderful rural views which make our landscape what it is.

We are drafting policies to protect and enhance our Heritage assets including our Cornish hedges. You can help too by letting us know if there is anything you think we should be safeguarding from development – please get in touch, contact details at the bottom of the page.

The Blue Green Corridors Map, drawn up by the Environment Agency and supplemented with Cornwall Council and Cornwall Wildlife Trust information, shows the extent of potential flooding in the parish. But in doing so, it also demonstrates how footpaths and Blue Green corridors crisscross the parish, linking the sea and Par Beach to Porcupine, Tywardreath, Lanescot, Kilhallon, Caruggatt, Polmear and through to neighbouring parishes.
